BLACK ABORTIONS BY THE NUMBERS

In the United States, the abortion rate for Black women is more than 3 times that of White women. On average, more than 900 Black babies are aborted every day in our country. This tragedy continues to impact the population levels of African-Americans in the United States. The abortion racial disparity is even more stark when the focus is on Michigan statistics as well (see graph below, comparing proportions).

NATIONAL STATISTICS

- More than 21 million Black babies have been aborted since the 1973 Roe v. Wade U.S. Supreme Court decision legalized abortion in our country.
- Non-Hispanic Black women have a significantly higher abortion rate (24.4 per 1000 women of reproductive age) than that of Non-Hispanic Whites (6.2) and Hispanics (11.4)
- 39.2% of all reported abortions in the U.S. in 2020 were performed on Black women, however, only about 12.6% of the total population is Black.
- African-Americans are no longer the nation's largest minority group. Today, Hispanics have outpaced Blacks in population growth.
- For every 1,000 live births, non-Hispanic Black women had 426 abortions. Non-Hispanic White women had 118 abortions/1,000 live births.

MICHIGAN STATISTICS

- Black women had 14,787 of the 27,359 abortions performed on Michigan residents in 2022 with racial data available.
- While Black women make up only about 14% of Michigan's female population, they had 54% of all abortions reported in the state in 2022.
- 91.9% of Black women having abortions are not married.
- Black abortion rate (per 1,000 women of reproductive age) by age group: Under 20 — 19.1 30-34 — 64.9 20-24 - 66.935 - 39 - 27.125 - 29 - 73.240 and over - 7.3
