


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OVERVIEW


STARTING A GROUP

- **BUILD A CORE TEAM.** Every club needs a solid foundation to be successful. The core group members must be dedicated the mission of Right to Life of Michigan, as well as volunteering and serving in leadership roles. Groups will not stay active without key members staying involved. This core group should be at least five people who bring a range of skills and motivation.
- MAKE IT OFFICIAL. You will need to find a teacher or administrator at your high school to be your advisor. They will help you coordinate with your school. You will also need to become recognized as a club by your school. This includes going to your school office and asking how this process works since it differs by school. You also need to ask your main office if a permission slip to stay after school and be in a club is required for all students.
- SCHEDULE A MEETING. Once you have your core group organized and an advisor you can schedule your first meeting. The best meeting time will be weekdays right after school. Your meeting should not exceed one hour in length. Pick a time and a location (your advisor can help with this). Ideally, your advisor is a teacher, and you can hold meetings in their classroom. Advertise your meeting by putting up flyers if your school allows this, by word of mouth and other means available at your school. A sample flyer can be found on page 11 of this guide. If you have a school newspaper or student announcements, this is a good place to share the meeting time and location.

GENERAL RULES

MEMBERSHIP

Membership in this club is open to any student attending the school committed to our mission. Members are expected to behave in a respectful and appropriate manner at all times during club activities.

ATTENDANCE

Members are encouraged to attend all meetings and events. Club officers should to be present at all meetings and events. You should let people know this during elections to avoid conflicts in the future. Your advisor should be present at every meeting.

FLYERS AND MATERIALS

Flyers and other materials for the public need to come from RLM. If you have a suggested design template you would like to see available, please contact the MiGen Leads Coordinator who is located in our State Office (Grand Rapids). If you have a flyer you created, you can email it to the MiGen Leads Coordinator for approval to use in public settings. Social media created by your MiGen Leads group to represent your club should also be consistent with RLM's policies and message.

RLM does not encourage the use of graphic photography (victim imagery) in public settings where young children can view them and where people are not warned about them. We do this out of respect for others. Please contact your MiGen Leads Coordinator if you think these photos would be acceptable in a certain situation and advice will be given.

MEETING RECOMMENDATIONS

GETTING STARTED

Your first meeting will be led by the MiGen Leads Coordinator.

After your kickoff meeting, schedule meetings for the remainder of the academic year at a regular occuring time. Figure out a day, time and location that works consistently to meet every other week. If your group is highly active, consider meeting every week. After the day, time and location are chosen, you can then promote your club on flyers around your high school to recruit new members. On these flyers, make sure to include your club name, time, date, and location of the meeting. Note that refreshments will be available.

SCHOOL YEAR MONTHS

These months should be filled with prolife speakers, videos, movies, educational presentations, and events you put together. It is important to stay involved with your location RLM affiliate. There are always big events in the fall to attend such as your local affiliate's Focus on Life dinner, the new March for Life in Lansing, the March for Life in D.C., prolife conferences, and other educational events. The MiGen Leads Coordinator will update you in the monthly meeting about what is going on around you and statewide.

DURING THE SUMMER

During the summer, school won't be in session, but MiGen Leads challenges you to keep your group active in some way. A schedule of events can be found on rtl.org.

CONSISTENCY IN MEETINGS

A general rule for meetings is to keep them at or under one hour long. You should provide light refreshments at meetings when possible. Ideally, the whole year is planned out in advance including meetings and events. At first, you may only have a month schedule in advance. As your club grows, it is important to keep working on a consistent schedule for the year.

OFFICERS

Many groups need more than just one leader to accomplish their goals. If you have a large enough group you should consider having other officers or board members. These officers should be reliable members of your core group who can help the entire school year. Give your officers their own defined responsibilities.



PRESIDENT

Announces and advertises meetings. The president creates and distributes the agenda for all general meetings. Presides over meetings and provides leadership to the group. The president is in charge of communication with the MiGen Leads Coordinator and the local RLM affiliate.



VICE PRESIDENT

Performs the duties of the president in their absence. Gives advice to the president on overall group leadership.



SECRETARY

Takes notes at meetings. Keeps a folder of all group records. Assists other officers as needed.



TREASURER

Keeps a record of the group's income and expenses. Helps organize fundraising needed.

ELECTION

Officers can be all elected, or you can hold an election for just president and have him or her appoint the officers.

Elections should be held before the end of the school year to give leaders time to plan and train over the summer vacation. Holding elections at the beginning of the school year could make your group lose valuable time during a busy season while leaders are found, and attendance could suffer.

Because students graduate and will leave the group, it is important that officers should always be looking for replacements and training other members to help with their tasks.

KEEP IT GOING

- HAVE AWESOME MEETINGS. Nobody likes a boring meeting, they should be both fun and informative. For active groups you should meet once a week! The meetings should be an hour or less and have planned activities. You can have a speaker from a prolife group or pregnancy center, watch an educational video, listen to the LifeBeat Podcast while doing activities, or plan your next event.
- **RECRUIT, RECRUIT!** All meetings should have sign up sheets for new members. Your members should always be proactive in growing your membership. By growing your base you have new members with fresh ideas to keep the club going when older members graduate.

Stand up and stand out to get new members. If you want to make a difference you have to be dedicated! Invite your friends who don't know if they are prolife or not.

KEEP MEMBERS INVOLVED. This will be one of your biggest challenges. Members need to be asked to help or volunteer regularly. Groups should always be doing something. You should ask new members about their interests and ways they would like to help.

Invite members to meet with officers who share similar interests. Whether the president does it or the officers split it up, they should keep in contact with all members regularly, it might be best to make a GroupMe for your club. If members haven't attended for awhile invite them back to a meeting or event.
