

Where the 2024 U.S. Presidential Primary Candidates **STAND ON LIFE**



JOE BIDEN (Democrat)

President Biden's Administration has pushed a radical pro-abortion agenda on virtually all fronts. Earlier this year, Biden's Food and Drug Administration removed long-standing safety guidelines related to use of the abortion pill, paving the way for pharmacy distribution of the dangerous drug in communities across America. The Biden Administration has allocated taxpayer dollars to abortion providers such as Planned Parenthood and removed the Mexico City Policy thus allowing taxpayer dollars to fund abortions overseas. Under the Biden Administration, the military now offers to pay for travel and time off for servicewomen to get abortions. NIKKI HALEY (Republican)

Ambassador Haley had a strong record of supporting life during her term as Governor of South Carolina where she signed a late-term abortion limit into law. She also opposed abortion expansion while serving as the U.S. Ambassador to the UN during the Trump Administration. During her presidential campaign, she has characterized herself as "proudly prolife" and favors working towards "consensus" on achievable issues, such as outlawing late-term abortions.



DEAN PHILLIPS (Democrat)

Representative Phillips advocates for the codification of abortion in U.S. federal law. This would force the legalization of all abortion across all 50 states and invalidate current prolife provisions across federal and state government.



DONALD TRUMP (Republican)

While President, Donald Trump appointed three prolife Supreme Court Justices, ultimately helping prolife realize the overturn of Roe v. Wade. During his term he also strengthened the Mexico City Policy, denied Title X funding to abortion providers, prevented the FDA from expanding the use of the abortion pill, and more.

Since then, candidate Trump has vacillated on abortion and declared life to be a losing political issue. At one point, he stated he supports a federal 15-week ban with exceptions for rape, incest, and the undefined "health" of the mother. Trump also called Florida's six-week limit a "terrible mistake." This overall approach represents a shift from his previously stated prolife position while campaigning for his first term.
